A Letter From Barbara

As I prepare to retire in December, I find myself reminiscing about my 30-year journey at NFCC. I came on board as Director in 1990 to work with my idol and mentor Mary Drake who had recently retired from the EOA neighborhood center. Mary and I shared a small room inside the Community Clothes Closet (now NFCC's Thrift Shop) in the North Fulton Human Service Center on Grove Way. Curtained shelves screening canned food lined three walls. We would visit with residents looking for help at a small table with two chairs. Volunteer Bob Knouse arrived with an enormous Unisys computer and taught me how to keep records on 5 1/4" floppy disks.

From that small room, NFCC expanded several times within the building and in 2005 purchased and moved to a freestanding 20,000 sq. ft. building on Elkins Road. We thought we had plenty of room to spare until three weeks later when Hurricane Katrina destroyed New Orleans and North Fulton became home to hundreds of evacuees. New volunteers and donations arrived by the truckloads along with displaced families in search of help. Busy days, months and years continued, including during the Great Recession when layoffs and foreclosures affected many former donors who reached out for help in their time of need.

Yes, we have grown over my three decades as Executive Director. It is interesting to me that NFCC is still serving the same percentage—7%—of our North Fulton neighbors. We have grown and evolved in proportion to how our community has grown. What has not changed is that NFCC still helps one family at a time, each with a unique story and need. What has not changed are the amazing people who are the hands, feet, head and heart of NFCC.

I am humbled and profoundly grateful for the many expressions of appreciation and best wishes at the news of my upcoming retirement. NFCC has always been a community-wide effort and will continue to be so long after I retire. It has been a joy and a journey for me and I am grateful to each of you for allowing me to journey with you. God Bless.

NFCC Holiday Program

North Fulton Community Charities has helped families with holiday assistance for over 30 years. Last year's annual holiday assistance program served over 900 families and 1,800 children. The holiday assistance program begins with Warm Coat Day on October 26th followed by a Thanksgiving Food Program in November, a Sponsored Families Program and Santa Shop in December. Holiday Baskets are also provided to over 150 local senior residents in November and December. This holiday assistance relieves the additional financial stress for families living in poverty or from paycheck to paycheck.


