North Fulton Community Charities (NFCC) experienced great change in 2019. After nearly three decades serving as a board member and then first Executive Director, Barbara Duffy announced her retirement. Barbara received countless awards, honors, and recognitions from the community and hundreds of notes from volunteers, donors and families she helped during her tenure with NFCC. Our community thanked her for the work she started as a volunteer and the charity she built with all of you. I also started as a volunteer for NFCC many years ago and was fortunate to have Barbara as my mentor.

I was honored the Board of Directors selected me as the next Executive Director this past October and worked with Barbara until she retired at the end of 2019.

What other changes did we see at NFCC? Mary Good was elected President of the Board in 2019, which is the first time in the 36year history of the organization that a woman has led the board. She has spearheaded a capital campaign to raise funds for a new building. This expansion will allow our assistance and education programs to be housed in a single building where we can provide wraparound services to our families.

Our services expanded to families by opening our food pantry six days a week and extending hours a few evenings a week. This has allowed us to reach more working families who can free up funds used on food to pay for housing. Additionally, we partnered with our schools to offer more ESOL classes. We typically have to turn away close to 100 adult ESOL learners each session—highlighting our need for more space.

We launched new events including the first annual Barbara's Bash, which honored Barbara's legacy and will honor someone each year in the community who exemplifies her standard of service. Our Ambassador program began with 20 dedicated volunteers to help share the NFCC story to the community.

With all the change, one thing hasn't changed—our mission, and our commitment to helping the families and individuals in North Fulton in need. Our mission is to build self-sufficiency and prevent homelessness and hunger in our community by providing emergency assistance and enrichment programs.

Because of you, our dedicated community, we were able to serve almost 10,000 individuals. You were the difference between a family being evicted or staying in their home. You were the difference between a senior having food on the table or going to bed hungry. You were the difference for a veteran getting the job coaching and career mentoring he needed to start a new path. You are the difference and what makes NFCC great. We can't thank you enough.




The Need in North Fulton

NFCC is the primary human services agency for residents in North Fulton County. We serve residents in a five-city area that includes Alpharetta, Johns Creek, Milton, Mountain Park, and Roswell. Although the cities in NFCC's service area are considered affluent, they are home to a growing population of families who are priced out of communities in which they live and work, often one paycheck, illness, or major expenditure away from homelessness.


In 2019, a family of four earning \$25,750 or less is considered to be in poverty. According to the US Census Bureau, **there are over 30,000 North Fulton families living below this poverty line.** They represent 8% of the population in North Fulton.

How We Help



Originally from Kenya, **Susan I**. about the N was living in the U.K. in 2002 Susan came when she applied to come to for the prog the U.S. through the Diversity Immigrant Visa Program. Fifteen years later, her application was selected and Susan and her daughter moved to Atlanta.

Susan was a support worker in the U.K., which is similar to a CNA assistant, but companies in the U.S. were unwilling to hire her without U.S. certifications. She found a job at a local grocery store, but when her hours were cut from full-time to part-time Susan struggled to make ends meet. The local elementary school that her daughter attended told Susan about the NFCC holiday program. Susan came to NFCC to sign up for the program and found out

about all the other opportunities NFCC offered. She took advantage of the free job coaching and made a plan to get her CNA certification. "I like helping people and that is what I've always wanted to do," she said. Susan applied to receive tuition assistance through the MJK Education Fund. The MJK Education Fund was created in partnership with the McKemie family to help NFCC clients obtain certifications or degrees in healthcare related careers. With the assistance, Susan started the CNA Certification Program at Kennesaw State University in January.

Financial Assistance • When individuals and families can no longer stretch limited income, they turn to NFCC for emergency assistance and support. NFCC caseworkers assess each situation, determine eligibility, and make assistance recommendations. Eligible individuals can receive a rent/ mortgage subsidy or payment for utility bills or other emergencies, allowing families to meet housing obligations and remain in their homes. Case workers also initiate in-house and partner referrals for social service supports, childcare, medical care and other critical needs. In 2019, our financial assistance team met with 2,517 individuals for one-on-one personal interviews.

Food Pantry • The NFCC food pantry is one of the largest and busiest in the area, filling 31,035 food orders in 2019. Many individuals and families use the NFCC food pantry to supplement SNAP benefits and stretch food budgets, freeing income to pay rent and other household bills and reducing the need to make the difficult choice of buying food or paying for utilities, housing, medicine, or other critical needs.

The NFCC Food Pantry is a client choice pantry, which enables families to make food selections from a menu of grocery items, offering a degree of independence and dignity to a humbling and stressful situation. There are more than 30 restaurants, grocery stores and community gardens that participate in our food recovery program to make sure good food gets in the hands of those who need it before it is wasted. Thanks to these partners, 67% of the food pantry orders in 2019 received

fresh produce. When I visit a family

representing St. Vincent de Paul, we review all of the family expenses. I have been to apartments where there is little or no food in the home. I share with them that getting food from the NFCC Food pantry will save them \$300-\$500 per month. That's a lot of money! The NFCC food pantry does a fantastic job helping families.

Education • NFCC helps guide individuals toward selfsufficiency by identifying and eliminating the barriers that lead to crisis and keep families mired in poverty. We offer free ESL, GED, and money management classes, complemented by a range of services that include Government benefits screening and processing, job coaching, free tax preparation, legal aid, and personal financial coaching—all of which are offered in English and Spanish. The program provides free childcare and evening classes that allow single and working parents the opportunity to attend.







Thrift Shop • Individuals and families who qualify for financial assistance also receive thrift shop vouchers that enable them to select free clothing and shoes as well as other necessities from the NFCC Thrift Shop. Whether it is a suit for an interview, a new pair of pants or shoes for a child during a growth spurt or work clothes for a new job, the thrift shop program helps families and individuals stretch their limited budgets while providing them with the dignity to shop and select items that work best for their situation and family.

Outreach Programs • Community outreach programs help families offset financially-burdensome seasonal purchases. We provide low-income families with backpacks and school supplies, warm coats, Thanksgiving groceries, and holiday assistance, which includes grocery store gift cards, toys and gifts for children, and gift baskets for seniors.

2019 ANNUAL IMPACT REPORT



When "Danny's" wife died unexpectedly, he was thrust into the role of single dad for his 10 and 12-year old girls. On top of dealing with the grief of losing his wife, he was struggling to provide for his family. He lost his job at a local car dealership after a back injury and the family didn't have reliable transportation for job searching, getting the girls to activities or even to the grocery store. When "Danny" came to NFCC, he teared up in frustration. The case workers worked with "Danny" to get food from the NFCC food pantry, listened to his frustrations and helped him apply for a donated car for his family.

"The donated car means so much for my family life," "Danny" said. "My daughters can participate in after school programs now, one plays an instrument. The food is a huge help, it fills in so many gaps and we are grateful there is so much produce and greens...it is expensive to eat healthy. NFCC is a beautiful thing."

Barbara's Bash

The inaugural Barbara's Bash at the Atlanta Athletic Club on September 14 raised over \$150,000 in net proceeds to help low-income families in need. 


