

By the Numbers



RESPOND.

In 2022, your support helped us respond to meet the needs of families facing soaring food prices and high rental rates.

Food Pantry

NFCC served 3,202 families facing food insecurity and distributed \$3.4 million in food.

It was a year like no other in the Food Pantry.

As food became less affordable, more families turned to the pantry for help. Staff and volunteers were filling 160-200 orders a day, and the food donations weren't keeping pace.

For the first time, our staff worried that we wouldn't have enough to help our families.

We reached out to local faith partners, corporations, civic groups and individuals for help. The community immediately mobilized, organizing food drives, contributing financially, and encouraging others to get involved as well.

No one who came to our door left empty-handed. **Volunteers** and staff filled 40,088 pantry orders — up 47% from 2021.

Eviction Prevention

Your support helped 1,071 families avoid eviction and utility shut-offs in 2022.

When the eviction moratorium was lifted in late 2021, many families in our community faced the real threat of losing their homes.

In 2022, rent for a two-bedroom in Roswell had increased to \$1,800, up from \$1,270 just 3 years ago.* Housing prices were stretching families thin. Any unplanned expenses — a medical emergency or unexpected car repair — could quickly lead to an eviction notice.

Because of your support, NFCC responded to ensure families remained in their homes while they worked to get back on their feet.

GROW.



NFCC expanded our education programs – 321 adults took steps toward higher wages and career growth in 2022.

Our English-as-a-Second-Language classes are in high demand. Many of our neighbors come to North Fulton from other countries with advanced degrees and valuable expertise but lack the English skills to secure well-paying jobs. With limited space in our classes, spots would fill quickly, and students would be turned away. So, we expanded our hours at the Barbara Duffy Center and began offering classes four nights a week.

By adding more classes, NFCC doubled the number of ESL students enrolled during the fall of 2022.

As struggling families looked for ways to stretch their income, they turned to the Thrift Shop. In 2022, **1,538 families received free clothing and shoes**, an increase of 18% over the last year. Help with essentials like clothing frees up a family's funds for critical expenses such as housing, gas and utilities.

LAUNCH.



This year, NFCC launched a new workforce development program and helped **76 men and women work toward better jobs and a build a stronger future**. Our new job coaching program matches job seekers with coaches who help them apply for jobs, update their resumes, navigate LinkedIn and improve their interviewing skills.

In partnership with **Summit Counseling**, NFCC also launched mental health workshops to help men and women learn to manage stress and anxiety.

"My job coach David was encouraging me all along, helping me and guiding me on what to do in terms of applications. He helped with my resume and with preparing for interviews. I went for a few interviews and finally landed at one job which suited my needs. It was just amazing."

Kelly, a workforce development participant, secured a job as a medical assistant with help from her job coach.

Seasonal Programs

1,600 individuals received assistance through our seasonal programs.

Extra expenses add up quickly for families in need. Your support of our seasonal programs helps relieve the burden of costly seasonal expenses for families who are struggling. Each year, families and seniors in need receive additional help through our Back to School, Warm Coats, Thanksgiving Food, Senior Baskets and Toyland Shop programs.

"[The seasonal programs] have been a blessing. This December, we didn't have the money to buy gifts for the kids because our rent is \$2200 right now. Us being able to get gifts at Toyland Shop...it makes Christmas for the kids."



Volunteers

Our work wouldn't be possible without our team of amazing volunteers. **Volunteers served 41,541 hours in 2022.**

In 2022:

- » NFCC welcomed 157 volunteer groups from churches, civic groups, corporations, high schools and more.
- > 441 recurring volunteers helped in the pantry, thrift shop and in-take desks and served as GED tutors and job and financial coaches.
- Volunteers also assisted with seasonal program and special events.

Thrift Shop

The Thrift Shop distributed \$462,064 worth of clothing and shoes directly to families in need.

If you've shopped the aisles or donated clothing and goods to the Thrift Shop, you've supported NFCC's mission. In 2022, the Thrift Store raised \$1,254,956 to help directly fund our programs and services. 25% of funds raised came from sales in NFCC's Thrift Shop in 2022.
